

The Little **MUSEUM** of **DUBLIN**

Social Guide

The Little Museum of Dublin welcomes everyone, and today we're going to take a little trip through each step of your visit so you know what to expect when you arrive.

Where is the Little Museum located?

The Little Museum of Dublin is located on St. Stephen's Green, inside a beautiful Georgian townhouse with red brick walls.



When can I visit the Little Museum?

The Little Museum of Dublin is open from 10:00 to 17:00, Monday-Sunday, though last admission is at 16:00. Saturdays and Sundays are the busiest days for the Little Museum of Dublin.

Admission is through guided tours. Once you have paid for a tour you may look around the museum.

When are guided tours scheduled?

The museum has house tours everyday at: 10:00, 10:30, 11:00, 11:30, 12:00, 12:30, 13:00, 13:30, 14:00, 14:30, 15:00, 15:30 and 16:00.

The museum has park tours everyday at: 11:30

How much does the Little Museum cost?

There are a few different prices for entry. These are the options available:

Guided House Tour:

The guided house tours happen every half hour. They last 30 minutes and explain the entertaining history of Dublin.

- Adult €10.00
- University Student/Under 18 €8.00
- Senior (Over 65) €8.00
- Family €25.00 - includes 3 children

Park Tour:

The Green Mile park tour happens once a day at 11:30 and lasts an hour. It describes the history of St. Stephen's Green.

- Adult €10.00
- University Student/Under 18 €8.00
- Senior (Over 65) €8.00
- Family €25.00 - includes 3 children

All Day Tickets:

All day tickets provide access to the museum at any point during the day from 10:00 to 17:00

- Adult €15.00
- University Student/Under 18 €15.00
- Senior (Over 65) €15.00
- Family €15.00 - includes 3 children

You may purchase tickets online or at the door.

How do I get to the Little Museum?

There are a few ways to get to the Little Museum of Dublin:

- You can walk to the museum, which is located right across the street from St. Stephen's Green.
- You can also take the bus or Luas. There are a few Dublin Bus/Luas stops on Dawson Street and around the green.
- If you drive to the Little Museum, you can park at Brown Thomas, the Dawson Street Garage, Drury Street, and the Fitzwilliam Hotel. 4.
- If you are on the DoDublin tour bus, you should get off at the St. Stephen's Green stop.

How do I enter the Little Museum?

There is one entrance and exit to the Little Museum of Dublin. It faces St. Stephen's green. Sometimes, this street can be very loud, with buses, cars, and people.

You will walk up concrete steps to the front door of the museum. There is no ramp. The front door is large and green. It will be open when you arrive, and you can step inside. When it is cold or raining, there will be a second white door to pass through; this door will keep you warm and dry. The light in the entryway is a soft yellow colour.



Ticket Desks

There will be someone waiting inside the front hall with a hand-held till. They will greet you and sell you a ticket.

There is a second ticket desk located to the left of the foyer. There is a glass divider on the desk to follow COVID-19 guidelines. You can find pencils, guidebooks, and crossword puzzles at this desk. You may also browse items in the bookshop, which is full of fun souvenirs.

Toilets

There are four toilets in the Little Museum of Dublin, with two on the first-floor landing and two on the second-floor landing. The doors that lead into the toilets are white.

Coat Closet

There is a coat closet on the ground floor beneath the stairs. If you wish to use it, you may ask one of the friendly tour guides to take your coat. When you finish your tour, you may go to the front desk and ask the staff to retrieve your things.

WiFi

The Little Museum of Dublin has free wifi. It is called *LMOD2*.
The Wifi Password is *Alfie1882*.

Helpful People You Will Meet At the Museum



Tour Guides

Tour guides do many different things at the Little Museum; they work on the tills and answer any questions. Tour guides also provide guided tours that explain the magnificent history of Dublin.

Tour guides may ask you questions, but if you don't want to answer, it's perfectly alright. Tour guides always try to ensure that you are having the best possible experience.



Volunteers

The Little Museum of Dublin also gets help from amazing volunteers. These are people from all over Dublin, and they love to answer questions. They are stationed throughout the house and wear name tags.



Interns

Interns do all sorts of things at the museum, but mostly they make sure everything runs smoothly. You are more than welcome to ask them questions or even chat with them about your day.

Getting Around

The Little Museum of Dublin continues to work towards a more accessible future. At the moment, one may access the upper floors using the stairs that run throughout the house.

If you get tired, you are always welcome to sit on the chairs and couches sprinkled throughout the museum. You can always ask a member of the staff for assistance.

The Ground Floor

The ground floor has three rooms. The first is the foyer, where you can purchase tickets. There is a blue rope that splits this area in half.

Through the door on the left, you may enter the bookshop.

There are dozens of books and nicknacks that you may purchase at any time. There is a desk in the shop where you may ask for assistance.

To the right of the bookshop is the Golden Age of Dublin exhibition, with dark blue walls. There are several pictures from Georgian Dublin that you may look at, as well as an informative video.

The First Floor

The first floor has two rooms. When you reach the top of the stairs, there will be a metal air-raid siren on your right, just beneath an old-timey clock. Sometimes people will wind this siren, and it can be very loud.

The door you will enter has the words 'Love Your City' right above it. This room is called the 1916 room and charts Dublin's history from the Georgian Era to the 1920s. There is a green couch that you are welcome to sit on. This is the room where the tour will begin. There is a wind-up music box by the windows, and it makes noise when wound.

The second room on this floor is called the Treasury, and it accounts for the 1930s - the 2000s. There are many photos and artefacts covering the walls, as well as a table with flowers on it. This room is where the tour will finish, and there is often loud applause. You are welcome to take photos on the big chair. You may also try the vintage slot machine if you like.

If there isn't a tour, an intern or volunteer will be available to answer questions.



The Second Floor

There are three rooms on the second-floor. This floor is self-guided, though you are welcome to ask questions to any staff members nearby.

A gigantic plush called Rodge will be waiting on the second-floor landing. You can walk past him to the Editor's Office, with green walls and a massive desk. This room is all about the Irish Times. There will be an audio recording that will explain the paper's history, as well as several photographs to enjoy.

The U2 room is the most colourful in the house. There are a few U2 songs playing on a loop. The lights will be flashing red and white. If it is too loud, you can always go to a quiet room, though the music can be heard throughout the entire second-floor.

The third room on this floor is an exhibition room that changes every few months. If you are curious about visiting, you can call and ask what the new exhibit is.



Leaving the Little Museum

The front door is also the primary exit. When you are ready to leave, you may walk down the stairs and exit through the gift shop. From there, you will be thanked by a friendly tour guide and led to the front door.

Helpful Tips

Please keep these helpful tips in mind.

1. Stay with your group, friends, or family.
2. Listen to the responsible staff at the Little Museum.
3. Follow government Covid-19 guidelines. This includes sanitizing your hands, keeping a 2 meter distance, and wearing a face mask.
4. You are allowed to take photos! You are also allowed to interact with the exhibits as much as you like! Please do!
5. You do not need to keep our voice down. The Little Museum is a place for friendly conversation and entertainment. But, if you are overstimulated you are welcome to find a quiet place.
6. If you have a question, you can ask the tour guides or anyone with a Little Museum of Dublin name tag.
7. If you hear fire alarms, listen to a responsible Little Museum staff member and they will lead you to safety.
